

Published in conjunction with esteemed Cava producer Juvé & Camps, *Wine Sapiens* is cowritten by renowned Spanish chef and restaurateur Ferran Adrià and Spanish wine writer Ferran Centelles. Adrià's goal—which he's met so far—was to create "the most complete encyclopedia in the world of wine dedicated to restaurant gastronomy." Applying what they call the "Sapiens method," Adrià and Centelles worked with scientists, sommeliers, historians, and more in a multidisciplinary series whose aim is to help sommeliers, wine lovers, winemakers, and viticulturists to consider the intersection of wine and gastronomy from every possible angle.
